MESSAGE FROM THE VILLAGE PRESIDENT

Fellow Residents:

Earlier this year, the Elected Officials of the Village of Matteson voted unanimously to seek a Home Rule referendum for our community.

Before seeking that status, we spent time learning more about what Home Rule could mean for Matteson—from quality of life improvements to economic incentives for developers, increased authority over rental properties to a more diverse base of tax revenues to fund our government.

We undertook and endeavor to educate the community about Home Rule and connected with thousands of residents through flyers, website content, social media posts and dozens of presentations to homeowner associations, church groups and community organizations. Throughout that effort, we attempted to make clear the circumstances facing the Village of Matteson if the Home Rule referendum passed and if it failed.

On Tuesday, November 4th residents voted against Home Rule by a 188-vote difference—51% to 49%.

The nearly 6,500 votes cast represented a substantial turnout and I want to thank each of you who took the time to vote. Though it was the closest Home Rule decision in the entire state, the majority of those who voted decided against making the Village

of Matteson a Home Rule community and each of us must respect the will of the voters.

A vote for Home Rule would have allowed Matteson to continue operating at the high standard you expect, while also keeping your property tax rates lower than nearly all of our neighbors. But as a result of this vote, we are now preparing to take steps that will likely change the face of the community that we call home.

These are not decisions that will be easy to make, but each of us was elected to represent you and your interests. We have made difficult decisions in the past. Four years ago, we had reduction in force of 21 employees and froze 4 additional positions as part of an effort to cut spending by 20%. Just a few months ago, we faced the possibility of another 15% cut and considered laying off dozens more police officers, firefighters, public works crews and administrative staff. Instead, we borrowed money and opted to seek Home Rule status.

Now, with Home Rule rejected and limited revenue sources available, we are preparing to cut millions of dollars from our annual budget.

The next few months will not be easy and the decisions made will likely have a lasting effect on our community. Still,



it is my hope that we can work together to minimize that impact and continue to ensure that Matteson remains a vibrant, strong and unified community for generations to come.

On behalf of the Ashmore Family and me, we wish you GODSPEED until we meet again.

GOVERNORS STATE UNIVERSITY BEGINS TRANSFORMATION TO 4-YEAR INSTITUTION

This fall, Governors State University officially transitioned from an upper-division college that admitted juniors, seniors and graduate-level students to a comprehensive public university that now additionally offers undergraduate courses as a full-service, four-year institution.

Within the past several months a number of milestones have been accomplished by the university including the selection of a school mascot, the unveiling of the first residence hall, and renovations to buildings on campus.

Back in the spring, GSU sought the assistance of students, faculty, and members of the community to choose a mascot and ultimately “the Jaguar” came out on top.

A few months later, on August 22nd, Village staff was present as GSU Board of Trustees Chair and Matteson Village Administrator Brian D. Mitchell assisted University President Elaine P. Maimon in untying the ribbon on Prairie Place, the new student housing facility.

The new residence, which the university president referred



to as a “living and learning community,” currently houses three faculty members and 225 students, 130 of which are freshman.

“Prairie Place is predominantly a place to learn and to realize that there is nothing more exhilarating than education,” Maimon said in a letter to students, faculty and staff.

Renovations to the library, the Science, Health Sciences & Technology wing, and additional facility renovations have also taken place on campus and contributed to the GSU transformation.

“Education has always been about change—seeing experience from different perspectives, developing a more rewarding life, making the world a better place,” Maimon said in the August 25th letter. “More than ever before, this academic year brings positive change to Governors State University.”

SNOW REMOVAL PROCEDURES

The Village of Matteson is committed to providing safe, accessible streets during inclement weather. A procedure is in place for clearing the streets of snow in Matteson. The initial concentration is on keeping principal routes and key intersections clear, and neighboring streets will be the second priority.

One thing that all residents want to do in preparation for the snowfall and removal is to make sure curbside mailboxes are in good condition. This includes both the box and the

post. If the box is not secure on its post, it will likely be knocked down with the impact of the snow. It will be the homeowner’s responsibility to repair or replace any curbside mailboxes that fall after being impacted by the snow.

Salting: For optimum results, the Village salts the streets before plowing to prevent snow/ice packs from bonding on the roadways. There may be times whereby salting and plowing may be done at the same time, but this is more the exception than the rule.

EMERALD ASH BORER (EAB) UPDATE

The Village of Matteson’s Public Works department continues to battle the infestation of the EAB. To date, Village crews have removed over 650 large Ash trees and over 1400 trees Village-wide.

The highest priority is to address the largest infested trees in comparison to smaller trees because they pose a grave danger to the community. These trees are more prone to cause damage when subjected to elements like rain, wind and snow. We will increase our removal of Ash trees in the coming weeks. As a result of these removals, we have many tree stumps remaining on the parkways, it is anticipated that



these stumps will be removed by village staff during the fall, weather permitting.

Our reforestation efforts will continue for several years until all trees that have been removed are replaced. Our reforestation plan will not allow for any one tree species to be more than 7% of the total tree inventory. By limiting the planting of a single species to 7%, the urban forest will not be as impacted by invasive species or diseases in the future.

MATTESON’S GOT TALENT WINNER CROWNED

Residents from throughout the Village as well as School Districts 159, 162 and 227 were encouraged to bring their talents to the Matteson Community Center to participate in the 3rd Annual Matteson’s Got Talent competition. A panel of notable judges included Grammy-nominated remixer Eric “E-Smoove” Miller and Ray Mayfield, President of Narski Music, Inc. Judges were seeking an ideal combination of skill and creativity. The winner

would have the opportunity to showcase their talent at numerous Village sponsored events throughout the year.

Ultimately, 19 year old Jamaal Huffman aka Jay Stones, impressed judges with his charming, smooth self-written song, “Paralyzed,” and was crowned this year’s Matteson’s Got Talent winner.

About a week later, Huffman put on an entertaining performance at the Taste of Matteson & Unity Day Celebration, the first of a few

Village events he is scheduled to appear. If you missed his performance at this year’s “Taste,” keep your eyes and ears open for Jay Stones at future Village events.

The Village of Matteson encourages residents of all ages and talents to participate in next



year’s event, which promises to uncover another local star.

CHRIS SCHWALBE SWORN IN AS FIRE CHIEF

Shortly after the retirement of former Chief Edward Leeson, who dedicated 23 years to the Village of Matteson, President André B. Ashmore and the Board of Trustees appointed then Deputy Chief Chris Schwalbe to the position of fire chief.

Schwalbe, who brings nearly two decades of experience with the Matteson Fire Department himself, started out as a full-time firefighter and paramedic with the Village in 1995. After also holding positions as an inspector, lieutenant and shift commander throughout the

explain what transitioning to this next phase in his career means to himself and his family.

"I believe my family is very proud of me knowing the hard work that I have put in throughout my career," he said. "I know at the beginning the general sentiment was 'you're going to do what?' But they have come to see how much I care about the Village, the Fire Department and the men and women that I am proud to say I work with every day."

Schwalbe also takes great pride in building relationships. Improving the department's



years, he was promoted to deputy chief on October 1, 2012. He was sworn in as fire chief at an August 19, 2014 Board of Trustees Meeting.

Growing up watching his uncles who were volunteer firemen in Wisconsin, Schwalbe explained that he had a natural curiosity in all aspects of the fire service in his early years. After completing training as a firefighter and paramedic, he began taking classes for his fire officer certification.

"The more I learned I realized that if I wanted to have an impact on the direction of the Fire Department, I had to aspire to be an officer," he said. "Of course the officer with the most impact is the chief and I am grateful every day for the honor and privilege to serve the Village of Matteson in that capacity."

Schwalbe went on to further

connection with the community is a crucial objective of his as fire chief. He explained that when he spoke with President Ashmore about the prospect of being appointed fire chief, he conveyed that his main goal is to be a

relationship builder; believing that everything about the fire service is about relationships with the elected officials, staff, residents, schools, businesses, neighboring fire departments, and internal relationships between labor and management.

"My perspective viewed all these relationships as needing improvement," he said. "If I can close the gap between the Fire Department and these groups I will feel satisfied that we will have a foundation of support that will put us in position for greater things in the future. Of course, my secondary goal is to always improve the efficiencies of our service. Continuously looking to provide what our community needs while stretching the tax dollars as far as possible and giving the Village of Matteson the most bang for their buck."

DEPARTMENT NEWS

RECREATIONAL SERVICES DIRECTOR ANTHONY BURTON RECEIVES AWARD OF MERIT

The Village of Matteson's Director of Recreational Services, Anthony Burton takes great pride in bringing visitors to the Village and showing them what the Matteson Community has to offer.

Burton's efforts were recognized when he received a Tourism Award of Merit at an October 1, 2014 ceremony hosted by the Chicago Southland Convention & Visitors Bureau (CSCVB).

The Award was presented to Burton "for his work with the Chicago Southland Convention & Visitors Bureau in bringing multiple sporting events to the region and for his vision and insight to take a municipal venue and turn it into a destination driver that creates significant economic impact," according to the CSCVB website. The award also recognized Burton's leadership in serving on the Chicago Southland Sports Commission.

Burton, who attended the event not knowing he would be accepting an award, was surprised and grateful to be the recipient of such an honor.

"I was extremely appreciative of the award for myself and the Village of Matteson," Burton said. "I was also surprised because I was not told that I would be receiving an award. This award means so much to me because it allows my peers and neighboring communities to see the Village of Matteson as a true partner in the field of tourism."

Since becoming Director of Recreational Services, Burton and his staff at the Matteson



Community Center have planned and conducted a number of successful sporting events in partnership with the CSCVB. These events include Keith Rucker's "Reach for the Sky" Football and Cheerleading camp, a large Nike Invitational AAU basketball tournament and an East West basketball camp in partnership with the Toi Baylor Youth Foundation, as well as the IMG Performance 7 on 7 Regional Football Tournament.

Along with his staff, Burton plans on continuing to bring in events like these on an annual basis, as well as maximizing facilities at the community center and becoming a destination for other events.

"We are hoping that over the next several years we are able to bring in a major running event and to utilize our swimming pool and outdoor amenities for more sporting events," Burton said. "Our goal is to assist the Village in putting people in our hotels and on our streets to assist in boosting our local economy."

TIPS TO PREPARE NOW FOR THE SEVERE WINTER WEATHER AHEAD

Cold temperatures, heavy snow, and treacherous ice storms are all risks of the impending winter season. Severe winter weather can be dangerous and even life-threatening for people who don't take the proper precautions.

Preparedness begins with knowing your risks, making a communications plan with your family and having an emergency supply kit with essentials such as water, food, flashlights and medications.

Once you've taken these steps, consider going beyond the basics of disaster preparedness with the following tips to stay safe this cold season:

Winterize your emergency supply kit:

- Before winter approaches, add the following items to your supply kit:
- Rock salt or other environmentally safe products to melt ice on walkways. Visit the Environmental Protection Agency for a complete list of recommended products.
- Sand to improve traction.
- Snow shovels and other snow removal equipment.
- Sufficient heating fuel and/or a good supply of dry, seasoned wood for your fireplace or wood-burning stove.
- Adequate clothing and blankets to keep you warm.

Stay fire safe:

- Keep flammable items at least three feet from heat sources like radiators, space heaters, fireplaces and wood stoves.
- Plug only one heat-producing appliance (such as a space

heater) into an electrical outlet at a time.

- Ensure you have a working smoke alarm on every level of your home. Check it on a monthly basis.

Keep warm, even when it's cold outside:

If you have a furnace, have it inspected now to ensure it's in good working condition.

If your home heating requires propane gas, stock up on your propane supply and ensure you have enough to last an entire winter. Many homeowners faced shortages due to the record freezing winter weather last year, and this season there's the possibility of lower than normal temperatures again. Don't be caught unprepared.

Avoid the dangers of carbon monoxide by installing battery-powered or battery back-up carbon monoxide detectors.

Winterize your home to extend the life of your fuel supply by insulating walls and attics, caulking and weather-stripping doors and windows, and installing storm windows or covering windows with plastic.

Prevent frozen pipes:

- If your pipes are vulnerable to freezing, i.e., they run through an unheated or unprotected space, consider keeping your faucet at a slow drip when extremely cold temperatures are predicted.
- If you're planning a trip this winter, avoid setting your heat too low. If temperatures dip dangerously low while you're away, that could cause pipes to freeze. Consider draining your home's water system before leaving as another way to avoid frozen pipes.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORNER

GROUND BROKEN ON NEW RESIDENCES FOR DISABLED

Village staff was present as a groundbreaking ceremony was held for a new residential facility in Matteson for people with disabilities. The ceremony was held on October 23, 2014 at 5150 Southwick, the future address of the new site which is scheduled for completion in spring 2015.



Southwick Place is the second project in the area for the Over The Rainbow Association, which according to their website, is an Illinois

not-for-profit association dedicated to providing independent living solutions for individuals with physical disabilities.

The 40-unit property will be in close proximity to Rainbow Village, a similar 25-unit facility in Matteson.

UPDATE ON WAL-MART DISCUSSIONS

Village staff and the President have met with Wal-Mart corporate as well as the broker for Wal-Mart on several occasions to discuss remaining and expanding in Matteson. After Wal-Mart spent millions of dollars for remediation on the site, the project did not come to fruition because the land is undevelopable due to the oversaturation of wetlands. The Village has presented several sites to Wal-Mart after the proposed Super Wal-Mart did not go as planned. Wal-Mart has also shared with the Village numerous sites they looked at as well and indicated the Village is no longer Wal-Mart's market; therefore, the retailer is considering relocating. In addition, Wal-Mart is a retail giant and most communities desire a Wal-Mart due to the high sales volume they generate, giving them the power to pick and choose as they see fit. The retailer shops

different communities for the highest return on their value. The Village has displayed the willingness to assist financially to make the deal happen, but as of today Wal-Mart has not given the Village of Matteson any official documentation indicating they are definitely leaving the community.

If you are interested in finding out more information about Economic Development efforts, the Village of Matteson approved a Master Plan for Economic Development and Land Use earlier this year. Residents had the opportunity to provide feedback and give suggestions on the plan at community workshops. The plan analyzes the physical conditions, market trends, and opportunities within the planned area, which outlines a roadmap to create improvements to further economic development growth. The plan can be found on the Village's website.

ENTERPRISE ZONE PUBLIC HEARING

The Village of Matteson seeks another economic development tool to help attract businesses to the community. A community-wide Public Hearing was held jointly by the Villages of Matteson, Richton Park, Park Forest, University Park, and Monee in an effort to establish an Enterprise Zone Designation and share the goals and purpose of the incentive with residents. These communities are partnering together to help build and expand regional development. An Enterprise Zone is designed to stimulate economic growth and neighborhood revitalization in which financial incentives are offered through the state and local level through various tax exemptions.

VILLAGE GROCERY STORE EFFORTS

The Economic Development Team and Board of Trustees along with Jones Lang LaSalle (prominent real estate firm) continue to pursue grocery stores through various business development efforts. Through these efforts the team has either met or had lengthy discussions

with over a dozen grocery stores about the Village of Matteson. The unfortunate aspect of economic development is the enormous time it takes to attract and develop a business before residents see the fruit of the efforts. Most of the grocery stores have their

projects committed over the next couple of years where the next phase will not occur until 2016. Please continue to support as many businesses in Matteson as possible. Business sales revenue speaks volume to a retailer, which helps with attraction efforts.



Congratulations to the Village of Matteson for protecting new homes with fire sprinklers

Village President André B. Ashmore and the Village of Matteson Board of Trustees



To provide an improved minimum standard for the safety and protection of Matteson citizens and firefighters, **Village President André B. Ashmore and the Board of Trustees, along with Fire Chief Edward Leeson and Shift Commander Sam Anello**, have adopted the latest editions of the International Code Council (ICC) codes, including the 2012 Building, Fire, Mechanical, Property Maintenance, and Residential (IRC) codes following the NFPA 13D standard for fire sprinklers in new single-family homes. With these home fire sprinkler requirements, Matteson is one of 94 Illinois communities that provide the best technology available for fire suppression.

All new manufactured housing, commercial, and multifamily occupancies are also protected by fire sprinklers regardless of their square footage. In existing commercial and multifamily buildings, fire sprinklers must be included when renovations or additions affect over 50 percent of the floor plan.

Congratulations for making fire sprinklers the community's major front-line defense against home fires, thereby protecting residents and responding firefighters to reduce deaths and injuries.

The Village of Matteson should be proud of its commitment to providing fire- and life-safety protection for the community now and into the future.
